



DR VIVIAN WONG, J.P., MBBS, MRCOG, MRCP(UK), FRCOG, FHKCOG, FHKCP, FRCP(London), FHKAM, FHKCCM, FFPH

A graduate of the University of Hong Kong, Dr. Wong trained in Hong Kong and London (Royal Free Hospital). In the late 70s and early 80s, she documented the perinatal transmission of hepatitis B and conducted randomized control trial to document the effectiveness of immunization of newborn to prevent perinatal infection. In 1992, she left her position of Reader in the University of Hong Kong for the post of Hospital Chief Executive of Queen Mary Hospital. In 2001, she was appointed as Director for Professional Services and Medical Development in the Hospital Authority.

Internationally, Dr Wong had been a Board Member of the International Federation of Obstetrics & Gynaecology and chairman of their Committee on Safe Motherhood. She has worked for The World Bank as Public Health Specialist focusing on health planning, policy and research. During that period, she provided operational support to two World Bank projects in primary health care in China. Subsequently she acted as consultant to The World Bank and advisor to the World Health Organization in different projects.

Locally, she is a committee / council member of Hong Kong Council on Smoking and Health, Supplementary Medical Professions Council, Hong Kong Association for Integration of Chinese-Western Medicine, the Management Committee on Area of Excellence of the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology, Advisory Committee of the Department of Management and Marketing of the Hong Kong Polytechnic University, Strategic Advisory Panel of Hong Kong Jockey Club Institute of Chinese Medicine and Chairman of Medical Laboratory Technologists Board. She has been President of Hong Kong Association for Maternal & Neonatal Health, and President of the Obstetrical & Gynaecological Society of Hong Kong as well as council member / member of Hong Kong Medical Council, Hong Kong Medical Association, Hong Kong College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists, Advisory Committee on Centre for Health Protection, University Grants Committee and the Open University of Hong Kong.
