Background of Revitalising Historic Buildings Through Partnership Scheme

- In the 2007-08 Policy Address, the Chief Executive announced a range of initiatives to enhance heritage conservation.
- The Government has earmarked \$2.4 billion for the Revitalising Historic Buildings Through Partnership Scheme (Revitalisation Scheme), putting government-owned historic buildings to good adaptive re-use.

Objectives of the Revitalisation Scheme

- To preserve and put historic buildings into good and innovative use.
- To transform historic buildings into unique cultural landmarks.
- To promote active public participation in the conservation of historic buildings.
- To support social enterprise development and create job opportunities, in particular at the district level.







The Advisory Committee on Built Heritage Conservation (ACBHC)

- The Advisory Committee on Revitalisation of Historic Buildings (ACRHB) was responsible for the assessment of Batch I to IV projects.
- The ACBHC was set up in May 2016 and took up the work of the ACRHB. It will be responsible for the assessment of Batch V projects.
- The non-official members come from the fields of historical research, architecture, town planning, engineering, surveying, social enterprise, finance, business and private practitioners of built heritage conservation.




Assessment Criteria of Revitalisation Scheme

The ACBHC examines and assesses the applications in accordance with the following five assessment criteria:

- Reflection of historical value and significance
- Technical considerations
- Social value and social enterprise operation
- Financial viability
- Management capability and other considerations









Residential facility, social welfare facility, training facility, shop and services, eating place, and other creative suggestions, etc.













Essential Element of the Revitalisation Scheme - Public Enjoyment


- Applicants should open the whole or part of the historic building to the public for appreciation on the premise that the social enterprise operation is not affected.
- Applicants may designate part of the building as museum or exhibition area to reflect the historical significance of the building.
- Applicants should allow free public access to the site as appropriate.
 Open days and guided tours should be arranged as far as possible.





Other Arrangements for the Revitalisation Scheme

- Eligibility of applicants
- Subsidies provided by the Government
- Submission of proposals
- One-stop support provided by the Government
