Note 1: As the handling of a case may straddle different years, the numbers of cases handled/with land clearance completed and the number of convictions by the court in a year may not correspond with the number of substantiated cases of unlawful occupation of government land within the same year.

Note 2: During inspection, the LandsD, where appropriate, will warn the occupier on the spot to cease occupation of the government land. If the person concerned accepts the warning and ceases the occupation, no statutory notices will be posted. The figures in this row include both cases involving and not involving the posting of statutory notices and in which the occupation of government land has ceased.

Note 3: The figures in this row refer to the number of substantiated cases of unlawful occupation of government land including those which are pending or has commenced enforcement actions.

Note 4: The LandsD will consider whether there is sufficient evidence for prosecution having regard to the circumstances of individual cases and the advice sought from the Department

of Justice. In addition, as of the end of 2023, there were another nine cases being prosecuted for unlawful occupation of government land but pending verdict.
